They come into the bar and it's a happy hour, so there's some background noise as they settle in and order a drink. They're new acquaintances, colleagues, maybe, and they're trying to get to know each other. But the conversation is a little slower, a little more oblique than if two native speakers had the same conversation. As the linguist and cognitive scientist Melissa Mishi-Bess writes about Quartz, this is because non-linguist speech is harder to understand the native listener. In other words, it may be more difficult to understand someone who speaks with an accent, even if they speak your native language well. Non-contained speeches deviate from natural speech of different sizes, from how single sounds are produced to the speed of speech. All these acoustic qualities can make non-native speech more challenging for local listeners to understand. It is similar to the way in which other types of listening can affect perception — think about the perception of the Party. Often the burden is placed on the non-native speaker to work for easier understanding. But there is more the listener can do to make the conversation a success. Most of all, baze-burke says they can train. Look for media such as TV, film, radio or podcasts that have non-local speakers to get to know better the acoustic qualities and pace of speech. If the native English listener spends some time listening to Mandarin and French, not only will it improve the understanding of speakers from China, France and Thailand, but the effect seems to extend to those from Guatemala, Korea and Russia. Researchers, myself included, are still investigating the exact mechanisms underlying this adaptation. If you're still struggling to understand, you can start by slowing your own speech down, an editor for The Muse writes: When the phone rings, I let it ring once or twice, then take a deep breath before answering. And whether I'm on the phone or in person, I'm forced to speak slowly, and in a slightly lower octa, which in turn makes others do the same and makes the conversation easier to follow. If you lack important words or phrases, start by wanting the other person to repeat; if that doesn't work, ask more questions about contextual clues or ask them to spell out the word you don't understand. Repeat what you have heard to confirm its meaning.
